On an international level, Rotary provides exchange programs for high school students, works tirelessly to eradicate polio, seeks ways to provide clean water, and much more.







JOHN COREMS—Rotary Lights Go-To-Guy (Dec. 10, 1945 to March 14, 2022)



When John Njivar came to the United States at the age of 22, he was looking for a whole new life. And that included his name. When the folks at immigration told him he could change his Slovenian name, he jumped at the chance. "He was tired of people mispronouncing his name," said daughter Tina Putney. And thus was born John Corems. And it wasn't just any old name he chose. Corems represents "Construction,

remodeling maintenance service." He lived up to that name, Putney said, and then some, giving those skills to Rotary Lights and other groups as he became an expert in animation and other trades that endeared him to Rotary Lights organizers.

Corems hooked up with Rotary Lights in the beginning because of his love for railroads. He was responsible for crafting a train that gave rides to about 10,000 children a year, said Rotary Lights President Pat Stephens.

But Stephens soon came to appreciate the meaning of Corems' name as he kept acquiring new skills to apply at Rotary Lights.

"He was our go-to guy," Stephens said. "He could fix anything and donated hundreds of hours."

"He wanted to know everything," said volunteer Steve Klankowski. "He always wanted to learn. He was just busy, busy, busy. But anything to do with the train, he put more emphasis," Klankowski said, because it was for the kids.

While Corems started out working on trains, everything about Rotary Lights interested him, said his friend and fellow volunteer Leo Chaput.

"When I'm done with my train layout, would you teach me to do what you do,"



Corems asked Chaput, who was working on animation.

When Chaput asked him why, Corems said, "I don't want to die stupid." Corems was the go-to guy who never stopped, Chaput said. "When something would break in the building, he would fix it. If the furnace would break, he would fix it. He was just the right person for Rotary Lights."

"John was a valuable asset to Rotary Lights, Tom Svec said. "He did many things to help. He was very helpful in keeping our building operating as well as many of the displays. He usually repaired many of the animated displays both large and small. He took command of the small train for the kids to ride in. He didn't want anyone else to do it."

Rotary Lights was the right fit for Corems, Putney said, because he could keep growing his skills and helping others. "When he had things in his mind, whatever he created, it was quality."

Klankowski, who did welding and repair work with Corems, said Corems wanted to help wherever he could so he was down at the workshop just about any time of day or night.

"He would put things together," Terry Slaback said, by figuring it out in his head. "His train had more bells and whistles than you can imagine. He would work endlessly on rewiring different things. It was unbelievable."

There was always something more to learn and more to do, Slaback said.

> I used to do a lot of welding for John, trying to help him with some of his projects," Slaback said, including the animated dragon Corems worked on with Chaput.

> Putney said she was so proud when she saw the dragon her dad had helped animate."My dad did that, the animation of the wings," she said. "He loved Rotary Lights. He really did."

> The things that stick out about John are his love for trains and his love for Rotary Lights," said fellow volunteer Zach Tudahl. "These two passions

intersected with two of his main tasks with Rotary Lights.

"First, with the train layout in the Santa House. He put many hours into building that each year and loved watching the kids enjoy his display. He was so dedicated that they would not take breaks, so when I was working in the park I would bring him coffee and a cookie part way through the night. He always appreciated this so much.

The other thing was the Kiddie Train. He was always so dedicated with these two tasks," Tudahl said.

"He was just a special person," Slaback said. "I told him, 'John, you will be associated with Rotary Lights for the rest of your life. You've done more than anybody in this whole organization."

"He was an angel around here-crabby sometimes, but crabby doesn't mean anything if it gets the job done," said Chaput. "You can imagine how we're going to miss this guy this year."



SHUPE-Volunteer Story

It begins to look a lot like Christmas at the end of October for the Doug and Merri Shupe family.

That's because the entire family volunteers at Rotary Lights in Riverside Park and work begins at the end of October when everything is trucked from the Rotary Lights workshop to Riverside Park.

But it's a drive that has to be made over and over again because volunteers have to transport all the displays that require millions of lights and the many structures visitors will be seeing this year.

For the Shupes' three sons, that was always the best part, Doug said.

"Their favorite thing was hauling all the stuff on trucks and trailers," Merri said. "They will get there early just so they can get a truck."

Son Nick agrees,

"We go to the 7 a.m. breakfast and then we dart over there," he said, to make sure they nab a truck.

Nick's friend Benjamin Storlie feels the same way about driving trucks, so he joins the Shupes at breakfast and then makes the break for the warehouse.

"It's an absolute blast," Benjamin said. "The sheer pace of trying to accomplish a collective goal with a group of guys," he said, is a shot of adrenalin.

But it isn't just about driving trucks, said Nick and Benjamin. It's about Christmas, which both feel is the most wonderful time of the year. And it's about helping others.

"I started to enjoy what it stood for," Nick said.

"The people keep bringing me back," said Benjamin. "It's just heartwarming to see all the work pay off. To give back is a meaningful thing as well."

All of this goodwill and volunteering is really thanks to Merri's brother Mark Dahlke, who told her and Don that this was a great project their whole family could be involved in.

"My brother Mark was involved and he sort of instilled the Rotary Lights as fun, and giving back to the community."

"We were always down in the park," Mark said. "And they were interested in adopting a charity."

So Doug joined, and then Merri, and soon their three sons and one daughter were also involved. And then they chose a night as the Shupe family night to work the park.

"The biggest thing is setting up all the displays," Doug said. "You have to transport all that stuff. There are several pickup trucks and trailer packages and you just keep driving back and forth. Once it's all transported to the park, you start putting it up."

And you just keep putting it up and testing lights until the Friday night after Thanksgiving when all the lights are turned on.

On their volunteer night, the Shupes are responsible for food collection, staffing the Santa Claus trailer, and making sure everything runs smoothly. That's right in Merri's wheelhouse since she's a retired teacher.

But they don't have to limit themselves to one night of working.

"If we want to go down there any given night, we can just show up at the trailer and volunteer. But each of the 32 nights is generally spoken for," she said.

One of the biggest jobs, Doug said, is making sure all the lights are lighting up.

"Everything is LED now and has been for several years and now we're replacing that. I don't think anybody really knows for sure" how many lights, he said.

"Over the years, we have purchased just under 5 million lights," said Rotary Lights Founder Pat Stephens. "We have not kept track of the broken, worn-out replacement with LEDs, etc. So we have close to 4 million in working inventory but because the park has lost so many trees over the years, we have more lights than we have trees to put them in," he



said, even though they buy five new trees a year.

"It's a lot of lights," said Doug with a laugh.. "The beauty of it all set up, it's something to behold."

"I'm always amazed when we're working how many people are there and how much they appreciate it," Merri said. "Everybody is so happy there."

And Mark says you don't need to be an electrician or an animator to pitch in and help. You just have to be willing to work.

"I'm down there working," he said, along with serving on the steering committee and board of directors. "I don't have any real skills, but I help put up the animation. I'm willing to go down there in the cold and spend weekends down there putting up and taking down."

And a love for the holiday helps.

"I really love Christmas," Mark said. "I love the holidays. I love the light displays. My wife and I grew up in La Crosse," he said and they remember "when downtown was lit up." But when stores left downtown for the mall, the downtown got a bit dreary, Mark said.

Rotary Lights changed that for him.

"Lighting up Riverside Park was meaningful to me. And it's such a good cause-feeding the hungry."

And through the years of working in the park, he's seen how one idea has grown into a powerful force for joy and good works.

"I'm amazed at how big it's become. I always tell people, Pat Stephens thinks on a whole 'nother level, several levels above me. He's the visionary. Every year he's thinking of ways to be better. It's never going to be finished with Pat Stephens. He's always thinking, 'How can I make it better every year."

Part of that better is the crew of volunteers.

"My entire family volunteers," Mark said, "and my wife, Sarah, is volunteer coordinator."

It's a fun family event, he said, made better because his sister's family is in the park, too.

For Benjamin and Nick, Rotary Lights is important because of the good it does but also because that good is done in La Crosse.

"I like that it's in La Crosse, in the heart of La Crosse," Nick said. "I love La Crosse as a city. And I like the end product of it and seeing everything lit up at night, especially after hours when we've shut the gates and all the lights are still on. It's serene. I love all the nonprofits that benefit from it. It brings a lot of the community together and I like being involved in that."

"I'm there just as much as I can be," Benjamin said, even if that means taking out garbage or running supplies to the other end of the park.

"It's been a lot of fun," said Doug. "A lot of camaraderie."



Heinz was a long-time "Santa's Helper" at Rotary Lights, filling out the Santa suit four or five nights during Rotary Lights' annual run.

"He loved kids," said Bill Peters.

He was the first, and was probably the best Santa, say his friends. And they should know. The Connors have known him for 40 years and still miss him in the pew at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Catholic Church in Holmen.

He was kind, he was funny, and fun to be around, said Steve Dunn. "He could talk to anybody."

And he did, including a kid who wanted Santa to deliver a boa constrictor for Christmas.

"No," shouted a startled Santa Bill, "Santa doesn't do snakes. How about a puppy?"

There was a detailed explanation to the no-snakes rule, said Mick, including how the snake might get wrapped around Rudolph and ruin the whole flying around the world expedition.

But it wasn't just kids that tickled Bill's fancy. When he heard about a woman in Melvina, Wis., who called herself the Melvina Witch, he insisted on driving to Melvina to meet her. Surprised to see a big guy coming at her, she was a bit intimidated. But Bill said, "I'm just a guy who wants to find a witch," and then he hugged her. In the beginning of his stint as Santa at Rotary Lights, said Mick, Bill didn't need the padding to play Santa. But he lost 100 pounds and then had to add to the costume to look the jolly part. And when he put on that costume, it had to be just right, said Teresa.

When Bill saw a Santa with a better beard, he found out where he got it so he could get one for himself.

"He did a lot of research," said Teresa, who once filled in as Mrs. Claus. But she only got one shot at the gig, said her husband, because she was so good with the kids that it cut into Bill's schtick.

"You don't need to come back," Bill told her with a fake scowl.

Rita Connor said he was a genuinely kind man who took care of those around him and noticed people who needed to be noticed. "He used to come to my mom's nursing home," she said, so he could visit with and cheer the lonely.

And if he was offered money for that or some other Santa gig, he would just tell them to donate it to Rotary Lights.

If there was a good time to be had, Bill Heinz was there having that good time whether it was as Santa in Riverside Park in the winter or as a commodore in Riverside Park at Riverfest in the summer.

> And even though he wasn't Irish, he was very involved in Irishfest because, as he told his Irish friends, it was a good time. "He was O'Heinz at Irishfest," said Mick.

> And outside of Rotary Lights season, Bill was big on kayaking. So big, in fact, that he created a website – BillHeinz.net – where he kept track of river heights, currents, temperatures and anything else a kayaker could need to know.

The website is still there, even though Bill is not.

The one place you might still be able to find Bill is in the church pew at St. Elizabeth's. For the first weeks after his July passing, the Peters and Connors made sure

there was a hat where Bill used to sit so that his seat wouldn't be taken.

"We miss him terribly," said Teresa, and they still felt his presence when they looked over and saw his hat.

They stopped putting the hat there after a while, "But nobody has sat there yet," said Mick. "He was always the first one at church," he said, and it looks like Bill is keeping up the tradition.


